Activity-Make a Butterfly Box

- Take a large box about 12" x 18" x 18"
- Make a habitat for the butterflies by putting grass, flowers, milkweed pods, plants, sticks or rocks on the bottom.



- Use a lid from a jar or other small shallow dish and add 1 teaspoon of sugar. Fill it with water. Mix until it dissolves. Place it in the bottom of the box for the butterflies to drink.
- Slip the box inside of a clear plastic bag. Look for clear kitchen or dry-cleaner bags.
- Catch live butterflies using a net. You will need to be quiet and walk slowly up to them. Place them in a small box or plastic container with holes so they can breathe until you transplant them into the Butterfly Box. Give them water like above.
- Watch the butterflies slurp up the sugar water through the plastic. Use a magnifying glass to see their curly tongues!
- Keep for a day or two, and then release them back into the wild.

Ice Cream Cups

Makes eight 5-oz ice cream desserts

Supplies:

Eight 5-ounce paper cups

Eight popsicle sticks

Ingredients:

1 quart vanilla ice cream, softened but not runny

Oreo cookies, roughly chopped

6 ounces of warm, chocolate fudge topping (not hot)

6 ounces caramel topping

6 ounces mini-chocolate chips

1 cup chopped nuts

Chopped M&Ms

6 to 10 peanut butter cups, chopped

Directions: Have a variety of ingredients on hand so that each person can make their own special flavor. Then begin layering in the paper cups. Start with the nuts or other candy topping, then add a small softened scoop of ice cream followed by chocolate or caramel sauce, then cookies or candies. Repeat. Put a popsicle stick in the middle of each cup. Freeze for 2 hours or until ice cream hardens. Use a scissors to cut a slit in the top of the paper cup, then tear it off and enjoy! The twins of mischief love these with gummy worms!



Personification is a literary device used when a nonliving thing is given the qualities of a person. At the top of page 75 it says "Bitterness seized its opportunity and pounced on Callie like a hungry lion. It choked out any glimmer of forgiveness." Bitterness isn't a person, but here it is used like one to get across an idea.

Write one way you think bitterness can be like a hungry lion.

When Callie said she was "itching" to show Dad her new pictures and then added, "No pun intended," she was using a literary device called a *pun*. A pun is a play on words and is intended to be funny. A pun is created by using a word that has two or more meanings . . . or by using similar sounding words that have different meanings.

When Callie was "itching" to show Dad her picture, she remembered the time she had poison ivy and itched a lot. When she realized she made a pun, she said, "No pun intended." This meant she made a pun accidentally, but it was funny anyway. At the very end of the book, Curt asks if they can stop off at Jack and Jesse's house on their way home to California. Grandpa says that Callie is just *itching* to go there. He *does* mean to make a pun this time. He makes them all laugh.


Send a Care Package to a Soldier
